Quantity versus Quality

I recently read an article written by an art gallery owner who is not an artist by the way, who felt that quantity was more important than quality. He didn't mean that artists should produce bad art, just more art. It's all relative as to what type of art you are making. Some art takes more time and is highly detailed or the medium is challenging. There is no one answer to how much art one should produce but what if you make your living with your art? Wouldn't that motivate you to produce more art? Conversely, if your art is not marketable, shouldn't you take the time to hone your skills until what you paint is of high caliber so that you don't become a "starving artist?"

There are many excuses why an artist doesn't produce a large body of work; lack of a perfect studio; the perfect model; the perfect materials. Nothing is perfect! There is much to be said about just focusing on your art, the more you paint or sculpt, the more you learn about yourself as an artist. You experiment with materials and techniques and begin to gain a mastery of your art. Does quantity win over quality or quality over quantity? It is up to you, the artist, to decide.

THE STROUDS: NOTABLE ARTISTS/WOMEN'S RIGHTS **ACTIVISTS/SUFFRAGISTS**

Ida and Clara Stroud, main founders of the Manasquan River Group of Artists should be recognized for achievements beyond their artistic landscape. According to our esteem Jersey Shore Art Historian Roy Pedersen, "Ida and her daughter Clara were two of New Jersey's most important artists at the beginning of the 20th Century. They worked to create opportunities for all women to exhibit and promote their art in an equal manner to that which was afforded to their male counterpoints. Ida organized some of the earliest exhibitions for female artists in New Jersey and in 1915 formed a group call the '9 Women Painters of N.J.' In addition to her advocacy for women's rights, Clara was a leading exponent for women's suffrage in addition to creating poster designs celebrating the work of leading New England suffragist Lucy Stone. Clara Stroud fought for women to have the right to retain and use their maiden names on their art after marriage. During 1919, which was the year that the 19th amendment for women's suffrage got congressional approval, Clara was hired by Pratt Institute as an art instructor. While exhibiting at the school the administration insisted that she sign her married name on all her artworks or be fired. Clara adamantly refused and hired Rose Falls Bres, President of the National Women's Lawyers Asso-

ciation to represent her. After a two page filing and a heated legal battle Pratt Institute relented and Clara remained on the faculty. She is now credited for creating a national climate for women to sign their maiden names to their art works when married."

But who were the Stroud mentors that fueled their efforts for women's rights? Margaret Wilson, the "bohemian" eldest daughter of President Woodrow Wilson became a national figure in the suffragist movement, which no doubt guietly convinced her father to support it. As contemporaries, it seems likely that Ida, Clara and Margaret were advocating on the same scene together while

> living nearby in the metropolitan area. During this time Woodrow Wilson was President of Princeton U./Governor of N.J. and then on to the US Presidency. Surprisingly, the most unexpected ad-

vocate for women's rights and the suffrage movement fell in the hands of the world celebrated William "Buffalo Bill" Cody. Through his platform with the Wild West shows

from 1883 to 1913, researchers now agree that his position in the cause for women's rights was a leading factor in wearing down the resistance from our US Congress to finally enact the 19th amendment for Women's right to vote. Unfortunately, Buffalo Bill could not celebrate his dream as he passed away just two years shy of this amendment. President Wilson's impassioned plea to the

US Congress in 1918 to enact the 19th amendment was window dressing to the suffrage movement with his rationale 'that our women who worked at home while their men were involved in WWI should now have all the rights they deserve.' But we're not buying Woodrow's political pitch without giving credit to those suffragists. Research now reveal that it was with the likes of Susan B. Anthony, Lucy Stone, Buffalo Bill Cody, Margaret Wilson and our Strouds who were the unsung heroes of the 19th amendment.
